
Tammy's Major: Journalism

I did take a couple courses in Chinese, and felt that the coursework was tougher. You could easily get by studying here with no knowledge of Chinese, but having the skill of Chinese will allow you to communicate with the locals more.

Interning Abroad: I did an internship at the Golden Bridges Foundation on the east side of Beijing. It is a non-profit that promotes exchange between young people. I maintained their blog and helped plan events. I was able to publish a few pieces of writing and meet people in various fields related to media. An internship abroad will show that you take initiative and will give you firsthand insight to what it's like to work abroad. I think that's important experience to have for our increasingly globalized world.

In meeting the people here, in universities and business, I found that Beijingers are quite entrepreneurial and open-minded.
